

The First Day of the Sacred Season of Lent February 22, 2023

Some Thoughts as We Gather This Evening For Worship...

Christians gather on this day to mark the beginning of Lent's baptismal preparation for Easter. On this day, the People of God hear the solemn proclamation to keep a fast in preparation for the Easter Feast, receive an ashen cross on the forehead (a gesture rooted in Baptism), and contemplate anew the ongoing meaning of baptismal initiation into the Lord's death and resurrection. While marked with the ashes of human mortality, the Church hears God's promise of forgiveness and tastes God's mercy in the Bread of life and the Cup of salvation. From this solemn liturgy, the Church goes forth on its journey to the great baptismal feast of Easter.

As we journey together towards Easter, we take with us the familiar words of the famous hymn, "Amazing Grace", during this 250th anniversary year of its writing. This hymn was in many ways autobiographical of its author, but its sentiments apply to every believer, for each of us as sinners were all "once lost, but now found"—all through the generous and amazing grace and mercy of God. This Lent, we look to our Savior's cross and His empty tomb and discover anew how we have been saved, made free, and given a new and abundant life lived by and through God's grace to us. As we walk together journeying to the Cross this Lent and to our Lord's Empty Tomb at Easter, we will discover anew the wonderful gifts that we receive through our Savior in His life, passion, death, and resurrection for us. Let us walk with Jesus this Lent, following Him and learning of Him that we may find our lives in Him.

The Invocation and Invitation to a Holy Lent:

- **P** In the Name of the Father and of the

 → Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C Amen.
- P Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's Passion and Resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now come in silence before the Lord, our Maker and Redeemer, and confess our sins against Him and our neighbor.

Silence is kept for a time for reflection and self-examination

The Litany of Penitence:

- **P** Let us confess our sins to God our Father.
- Most holy and merciful Father: we confess to You and to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth, that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.
- **P** We have not loved You with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.
- **C** Have mercy on us, Lord.
- **P** We have been deaf to Your call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved Your Holy Spirit.
- **C** Have mercy on us, Lord.

- P We confess to You, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness, the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives,
- **C** We confess to You, Lord.
- P Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,
- **C** We confess to You, Lord.
- P Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves,
- **C** We confess to You, Lord.
- P Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,
- **C** We confess to You, Lord.
- P Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us,
- **C** We confess to You, Lord.
- Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,
- C Accept our repentance, Lord.
- P For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,
- C Accept our repentance, Lord.
- P For our waste and pollution of Your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,
- **C** Accept our repentance, Lord.
- P Restore us, good Lord, and let Your anger depart from us;
- **C** Favorably hear us, for Your mercy is great.

The Blessing and Imposition of Ashes:

- Almighty God, You have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these Hashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by Your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior.
- C Amen.

The people continue to be seated and those who wish may come forward to the Baptismal Font to have the sign of the cross imposed in ash on their foreheads with the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." During this action, the congregation is invited to join in singing the Litany Hymn...







Bless the places where Your people gather around Your Word, and bless all those who teach and those who learn. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- P Guard those in authority over us, especially our president and Congress, that our laws may be just and justly applied, to the punishment of the evil doer and for the pursuit of virtue. Where our laws are unjust or contrary to Your Word, lead them for Your mercy's sake to make right the wrong so that we may act in good conscience as citizens of this land. Lord, in Your mercy,
- **C** hear our prayer.
- P Comfort those in any distress, and grant healing to the sick, peace to those troubled and Your presence to the dying, especially those for whom our prayers have been requested that we lift before You now in our hearts... Bring us through trouble and trial by Your grace, that we may sing anew Your wondrous mercy and love. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.

- P Deliver us from the love of things, and keep from our hearts the idols who would distract us from Your abiding love and favor in Christ, our Lord. Give to us generous hearts, that the poor may be relieved and the work of Your Kingdom unhindered by any lack. Accept, with the worship of our hearts, the tithes and offerings we bring, in gratitude and thanksgiving. Lord, in Your mercy,

- C Amen.






→ Body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me."


The Distribution of Holy Communion

Holy Communion is celebrated in this place in the joyful confidence that Jesus Christ Himself comes to us to give us in bread and wine His very Body and Blood to offer to us the forgiveness of sins. All Baptized Christians who have been instructed in the meaning of this Sacrament and confess with us Christ's Real Presence in this Holy Meal are welcome to commune with us at this Altar

Holy Communion is distributed to the congregation at the chancel rail. Please follow the direction of the ushers to make your way to the Altar. You may kneel or stand as you feel comfortable. The Sacrament is distributed in the following manner...Please extend your hand to the assistant to receive the Body of Christ. Christ's Blood may be received in one of three ways, using that which you feel most comfortable: 1) individual cups containing wine and white grape juice will be offered by the Pastor, 2) intinction: dipping the bread lightly into the chalice held by the Pastor, or 3) drinking from the chalice. Children and those not wishing to receive the Sacrament are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing.


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The Sacred Season of Lent 2023

Amazing grace—how sweet the sound—that saved a wretch like me!

I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see!

Lutheran Service Book Hymn # 744:1

This year marks the 250th anniversary of the writing of what some may call "America's Favorite Hymn"—*Amazing Grace*. What is interesting about this statement is that America can only claim half of the hymn. The tune that this text has been wedded came from a nineteenth century American collection of hymns known as the *Columbian Harmony*, published almost 50 years after the words of the hymn appeared in 1773—in England, three years before our nation's independence.

The author of the hymn was John Newton: an Englishman, former dissolute slave ship captain, convert to Christianity, and Anglican priest. He wrote the hymn for his congregation in Olney, England where it was first sung on New Year's Day, 1773. The text grew out of Newton's sermon for that day on "Faith's Review and Expectation" from the text 1 Chronicles 17:16-17, where King David says: "Who am I, O Lord God, and what is my house, that You have brought me thus far?" The hymn is very much a reflection not only of this text, but also of the life and conversion of the believer who wrote these words.

It is a hymn that is well known and loved by many believers who have also come to see themselves in these words, laying claim to the amazing love and mercy of God who gives them forgiveness, life, and salvation.

What is interesting though about this hymn is that because of the faith of its author and the faith which countless Christians have sung these words, the Source of this Amazing Grace has always been thought to be implied in the hymn, even though the words in it never directly reveal it, not even mentioning the person and work of the Savior, Jesus Christ. Perhaps it is for this reason that the folksinger, Joan Baez, who sang the song often in the 1960s, could say: "I never thought of it as a Christian song...I don't think that anyone at the time thought of it as a religious song".
