

The Scripture Reading for the Day

1 Peter 1:13—2:3

¹³Therefore, preparing your minds for action, and being sober-minded, set your hope fully on the grace that will be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. ¹⁴As obedient children, do not be conformed to the passions of your former ignorance, ¹⁵but as he who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct, ¹⁶since it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." ¹⁷And if you call on him as Father who judges impartially according to each one's deeds, conduct yourselves with fear throughout the time of your exile, ¹⁸knowing that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, ¹⁹but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot. ²⁰He was foreknown before the foundation of the world but was made manifest in the last times for your sake, ²¹who through him are believers in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

²²Having purified your souls by your obedience to the truth for a sincere brotherly love, love one another earnestly from a pure heart, ²³since you have been born again, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God; ²⁴for

"All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass. The grass withers, and the flower falls, ²⁵but the word of the Lord remains forever."

And this word is the good news that was preached to you.

^{2:1}So put away all malice and all deceit and hypocrisy and envy and all slander. ²Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up to salvation— ³if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

The Scripture Study for the Day

Baptized...Now We Live *A Study of 1 Peter*

Study 2: Who Do We Live For?

- 1. Peter calls on his hearers to prepare their minds for action. What are we preparing ourselves for? And are we really the ones doing the preparing? (vs. 13)
- 2. What is the "ignorance" that Peter speaks of in verse 14? What does ignorance lead us to do?
- 3. Peter quotes the Old Testament where God says, "Be holy, for I am holy" (Leviticus 11:44). Sometimes this verse is used to preach the Law and remind us that we can never be as holy as God. But is that really why Peter uses this verse? What is Peter trying to remind his hearers?

 Recall that many Christians in Peter's day were being pressured by the Jews around them to convert back to Judaism. How do we interpret Peter's words in verses 18-19 in light of this? How do verses 18-21 make it clear that we are not saved by our own works? Who is it who does the purifying of our souls? How is this connected to the "obedience to the truth"? What is the fruit of both of these things? (vss. 22-23 and 2:1) What is the source of our new birth and what sustains this new life in us? (vss. 24-25) What should God's Word be for us? Why does Peter call on us to be "newborn infants" with regards to God's Word? (2:2-3) 	4.	We are to live our lives in view of God's judgment. Sometimes we are hesitate to speak like that, for we know that we have been cleansed by Christ's blood; we have nothing to fear in the judgement for we will be judged on the basis of His works, not ours. But the Bible writers often speak of God judging us in view of our works. How should we understand Peter's encouragement to us serve the Lord because He will judge our works? (vs. 17)

The Prayers:

- **P** On this day that the Lord has made, let us pray for all the people He has redeemed.

- Let us commend the world, for which Christ died and rose again from the dead, to the mercy and protection of God as we offer to Him our prayers, either silently or aloud.

Open prayer may be offered and silence is kept.

 who trespass against us;
 and lead us not into temptation,
 but deliver us from evil.
 For Thine is the kingdom
 and the power and the glory
 forever and ever. Amen.

The Collect of the Day:

- **P** Let us pray.
 - O God, through the humiliation of Your Son You raised up the fallen world. Grant to Your faithful people, rescued from the peril of everlasting death, perpetual gladness and eternal joys; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
- C Amen.

The Collect for the Easter Season:

- O God, for our redemption You gave Your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross and by His glorious resurrection delivered us from the power of the enemy. Grant that all our sin may be drowned through daily repentance and that day by day we may arise to live before You in righteousness and purity forever; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.
- C Amen.

The Collect for Peace:

- O God, from whom come all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works, give to us, Your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, that our hearts may be set to obey Your commandments and also that we, being defended from the fear of our enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
