The Scripture Reading for the Day

1 Peter 2:4-12

<sup>4</sup>As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, <sup>5</sup>you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. <sup>6</sup>For it stands in Scripture:

"Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious, and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

<sup>7</sup>So the honor is for you who believe, but for those who do not believe,

"The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone,"

<sup>8</sup>and

"A stone of stumbling, and a rock of offense."

They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do.

<sup>9</sup>But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. <sup>10</sup>Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

<sup>11</sup>Beloved, I urge you as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions of the flesh, which wage war against your soul. <sup>12</sup>Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation.

The Scripture Study for the Day

Baptized...Now We Live A Study of 1 Peter

Study 3: What Have We Been Made to Be and to Do?

- 1. Who is this "living stone" that we are drawn to? Why does Peter call Him living? (vs. 4)
- 2. Why are we also called "living stones"? What is this "house" that we are built up to become, and for what purpose? Why must this house be built up upon the "living stone"? (vs. 5)
- 3. In verses 6-8, Peter uses various Scriptures to explain the importance of this "living stone" that God's people are built upon (See Isaiah 28:16; Psalm 118:22; Isaiah 8:14). Jesus used some of these words to speak of Himself and the work He came to accomplish (see Matthew 21:33-46). While we know that Jesus came to save and redeem all people, why is He a "stone of stumbling"?
- 4. The titles which Peter uses and gives to God's people, the Church, are not new, but they come from the history of the people of Israel (vs. 9a). See how God speaks about Israel at Sinai in Exodus 19:1-6. How is God's making of Israel into His people similar to how God makes the Church into His people through Christ?

- As God's people, what work are we called to be about? (vs. 9b) How are these "excellencies" connected to what Peter says of us as God's people in verse 10? (see also Hosea 1:2-11)
- 6. What does Peter call God's people to do in their life and living? Why is this important? How does it witness to the "Gentiles", especially on "the day of visitation"? (vss. 11-12; see also Matthew 5:14-16)

The Prayers:

**P** On this day that the Lord has made, let us pray for all the people He has redeemed.

Let us pray that we may live as those who believe in the triumph of Christ's cross: **O Lord, hear us.** 

- Let us pray that all people everywhere may receive the Good News of His victory:O Lord, hear us.
- **P** Let us pray that all those born to new life in the waters of Baptism may know the power of the Lord's resurrection:

- Let us rejoice in the lives of all of God's saints, and let us pray that in the undying love of Christ we may be at last united with all who have died in the faith of Christ in the joys of God's eternal kingdom:
- **C** O Lord, hear us.
- Let us commend the world, for which Christ died and rose again from the dead, to the mercy and protection of God as we offer to Him our prayers, either silently or aloud.
