⁹What gain has the worker from his toil? ¹⁰I have seen the business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. ¹¹He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. ¹²I perceived that there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; ¹³also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil—this is God's gift to man.

¹⁴I perceived that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it. God has done it, so that people fear before him. ¹⁵That which is, already has been; that which is to be, already has been; and God seeks what has been driven away.

¹⁶Moreover, I saw under the sun that in the place of justice, even there was wickedness, and in the place of righteousness, even there was wickedness. ¹⁷I said in my heart, God will judge the righteous and the wicked, for there is a time for every matter and for every work. ¹⁸I said in my heart with regard to the children of man that God is testing them that they may see that they themselves are but beasts. ¹⁹For what happens to the children of man and what happens to the beasts is the same; as one dies, so dies the other. They all have the same breath, and man has no advantage over the beasts, for all is vanity. ²⁰All go to one place. All are from the dust, and to dust all return. ²¹Who knows whether the spirit of man goes upward and the spirit of the beast goes down into the earth? ²²So I saw that there is nothing better than that a man should rejoice in his work, for that is his lot. Who can bring him to see what will be after him?

The Scripture Study for the Day:

Questions to guide our study...

- 1. In verses 1-9, what point is Solomon driving home in this listing he gives of these "moments in life"? Do they also show the theme of the meaninglessness of life?
- 2. We rightly focus on how the bad times follow the good and negate our toils. But the opposite is also true—good times follow the bad. What comfort can we draw from this?
- 3. What is the burden that Solomon speaks of as the "business" God has given to man? Though there is a burden, what is still good for human beings to do? (verses 10-13)
- 4. The sense of eternity, the knowledge of a Creator, and our inability to change the cycles of life join together for one purpose. What is that purpose? (verses 14-15)
- 5. What is another meaningless activity described in verses 16-17?
- 6. What does God want people to see about their condition as they ponder their common fate with the animals? (verses 18-22)

P Let us commend ourselves, and all for whom we pray, to the mercy and protection of God.
