P	¹² Who can discern his errors? Declare me innocent from hidden faults.
C	¹³ Keep back your servant also from presumptuous sins; let them not have dominion over me! Then I shall be blameless,

and innocent of great transgression.

 ¹⁴Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer.

The Scripture Reading for the Day

Ecclesiastes 1:12-18

¹²I the Preacher have been king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³And I applied my heart to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven. It is an unhappy business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. ¹⁴I have seen everything that is done under the sun, and behold, all is vanity and a striving after wind.

¹⁵What is crooked cannot be made straight, and what is lacking cannot be counted.

¹⁶I said in my heart, "I have acquired great wisdom, surpassing all who were over Jerusalem before me, and my heart has had great experience of wisdom and knowledge." ¹⁷And I applied my heart to know wisdom and to know madness and folly. I perceived that this also is but a striving after wind.

¹⁸For in much wisdom is much vexation, and he who increases knowledge increases sorrow.

The Scripture Study for the Day:

Questions to guide our study...

1. What was Solomon's goal? What qualified him to do this work? (verses 13 & 16)

- 2. Why is seeking answers to life an "unhappy business"? (verses 13 & 15)
- 3. What was Solomon's ultimate quest? (verse 17)

- 4. What conclusion does Solomon reach about the pursuit of human wisdom and knowledge as the basis for a satisfying life?
- 5. What are we to make of Solomon's "proverb" in verse 18? Why is wisdom and knowledge a "burden"?
- 6. From a purely human perspective, can we truly understand life?
- 7. To understand life fully, where must we turn?

■ Let us rejoice in the lives of all of God's saints, and let us pray that in the undying love of Christ we may be at last united with all who have died in the faith of Christ in the joys of God's eternal kingdom:

C O Lord, hear us.

P Let us commend ourselves, and all for whom we pray, to the mercy and protection of God.

P Taught by our Lord and trusting His promises, we are bold to pray:

 C Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.
 For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

The Collect of the Day:

Let us pray.
 Almighty God, You exalted Your Son to the place of all honor and authority.
 Enlighten our minds by Your Holy Spirit that, confessing Jesus as Lord, we may be led into all truth; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

P O God, from whom come all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works, give to us, Your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, that our hearts may be set to obey Your commandments and also that we, being defended from the fear of our enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.
