



Anyone who desires, child or adult, may come forward to receive a blessing.

The Epistle 1 Corinthians 1:18-31

¹⁸The word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,

and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, ²³but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, ²⁴but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men.

²⁶For consider your calling, brothers: not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. ²⁷But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; ²⁸God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, ²⁹so that no human being might boast in the presence of God. ³⁰He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, whom God made our wisdom and our righteousness and sanctification and redemption. ³¹Therefore, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."



Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for our Christian lives, that we lead holy lives because Christ has cleansed our bodies to be God's temples, that we live by God's commandments because He has brought us out of sin's house of slavery, and that all our actions love both God and our neighbor. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for those who govern in our world, that they see that God's commandments, written on our hearts, are not burdens but blessings that lead to improved lives and a better society; that they be guided to godly decisions; and that they defend life and uphold justice. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for those who are hospitalized, recovering from surgery, facing chronic pain or long-term health problems, and all who suffer as a result of living in a fallen world, especially remembering _____, that God would grant mercy and perseverance, as well as healing according to His good and gracious will. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for those who mourn (especially for _____), that in their time of sorrow they would not lose hope but rely on God's promise that He will never leave them or forsake them. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- With those who have received special blessings from God, we rejoice, especially with _____; and we pray that all of God's people would continue to offer their thanks and praise to the Lord for every blessing given to them from His gracious hand. Lord, in Your mercy
- **C** hear our prayer.

- P Let us pray for all the people and concerns that have been committed to our prayers, especially _____ and all those we name before the Lord in the silence of our hearts... We pray that the Lord will indeed hear these prayers and grant them all according to His good and gracious will. Lord, in Your mercy,

- P Let us pray for the faithful who receive Christ's Body and Blood this day, that the Holy Spirit grant us true repentance, faith that believes this simple gift is God's power for our salvation, and joy because we are receiving Jesus, who is our wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption. 



The Prayer of Thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer:

- P Blessed are You, O Lord our God, King of all creation, for You have had mercy on us and given Your only-begotten Son that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. At Your command, Abraham prepared to offer his son Isaac as a sacrifice on the mountain; yet, in mercy You provided a ram as a substitute. We give You thanks that on Calvary You spared not Your only Son but sent Him to offer His life as a ransom for many. As we eat and drink His Body and Blood, grant us, like Abraham our father, to trust in Your promise now fulfilled in Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. 


The Distribution of Holy Communion

Holy Communion is celebrated in this place in the joyful confidence that Jesus Christ Himself comes to us to give us in bread and wine His very Body and Blood to offer to us the forgiveness of sins. All Baptized Christians who have been instructed in the meaning of this Sacrament and confess with us Christ's Real Presence in this Holy Meal are welcome to commune with us at this Altar. A fuller explanation of what Lutherans believe concerning Holy Communion may be found on page one of this worship folder.

Holy Communion is distributed to the congregation at the chancel rail. Please follow the direction of the ushers to make your way to the Altar. You may kneel or stand as you feel comfortable. The Sacrament is distributed in the following manner...Please extend your hand to the assistant to receive the Body of Christ. Christ's Blood may be received in one of two ways, using that which you feel most comfortable: 1) individual cups containing wine and white grape juice will be offered by the Pastor, or 2) drinking from the chalice. Children and those not wishing to receive the Sacrament are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing.





March 7 **Perpetua & Felicitas**, *Martyrs*


