





The Confession of Sins and Absolution:

- **P** If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.
- But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.


The Introit of the Day

## The Old Testament Reading

Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

<sup>1</sup> All the people gathered as one man into the square before the Water Gate. And they told Ezra the scribe to bring the Book of the Law of Moses that the LORD had commanded Israel. <sup>2</sup>So Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could understand what they heard, on the first day of the seventh month. <sup>3</sup>And he read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand. And the ears of all the people were attentive to the Book of the Law. ...

<sup>5</sup>And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was above all the people, and as he opened it all the people stood. <sup>6</sup>And Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. And they bowed their heads and worshiped the LORD with their faces to the ground. ...

<sup>8</sup>They read from the book, from the Law of God, clearly, and they gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

<sup>9</sup>And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept as they heard the words of the Law. <sup>10</sup>Then he said to them, "Go your way. Eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions to anyone who has nothing ready, for this day is holy to our Lord. And do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

- **L** This is the Word of the Lord.
- **C** Thanks be to God.

<sup>12</sup>For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup>For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

<sup>14</sup>For the body does not consist of one member but of many. <sup>15</sup>If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>16</sup>And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>17</sup>If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? <sup>18</sup>But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. <sup>19</sup>If all were a single member, where would the body be? <sup>20</sup>As it is, there are many parts, yet one body.


<sup>21</sup>The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." <sup>22</sup>On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup>and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, <sup>24</sup>which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, <sup>25</sup>that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. <sup>26</sup>If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.

<sup>27</sup>Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. <sup>28</sup>And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. <sup>29</sup>Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? <sup>30</sup>Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? <sup>31a</sup>But earnestly desire the higher gifts.

<sup>16</sup>[Jesus] came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. And as was his custom, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and he stood up to read. <sup>17</sup>And the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written,

<sup>18</sup>"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me

to proclaim good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives

and recovering of sight to the blind,

to set at liberty those who are oppressed,

<sup>19</sup>to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

<sup>20</sup>And he rolled up the scroll and gave it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. <sup>21</sup>And he began to say to them, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." <sup>22</sup>And all spoke well of him and marveled at the gracious words that were coming from his mouth. And they said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" <sup>23</sup>And he said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Physician, heal yourself.' What we have heard you did at Capernaum, do here in your hometown as well." <sup>24</sup>And he said, "Truly, I say to you, no prophet is acceptable in his hometown. <sup>25</sup>But in truth, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah, when the heavens were shut up three years and six months, and a great famine came over all the land, <sup>26</sup>and Elijah was sent to none of

them but only to Zarephath, in the land of Sidon, to a woman who was a widow. <sup>27</sup>And there were many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian." <sup>28</sup>When they heard these things, all in the synagogue were filled with wrath. <sup>29</sup>And they rose up and drove him out of the town and brought him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they could throw him down the cliff. <sup>30</sup>But passing through their midst, he went away.

The Sermon

The Anointed One Text: Luke 4:16-30

#### The Nicene Creed:

- I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth and of all things visible and invisible.
  - And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of His Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father, by whom all things were made; who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary and was made man; and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate. He suffered and was buried. And the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures and ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of the Father. And He will come again with glory to judge both the living and the dead, whose kingdom will have no end.
  - And I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and Giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified, who spoke by the prophets. And I believe in one holy Christian and apostolic Church, I acknowledge one Baptism for the remission of sins, and I look for the resurrection of the dead and the life + of the world to come. Amen.

## The Prayer of the Church:

- As people granted faith to know that the Christ has come to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor and that He has made us members of His body, let us pray for God's mercy on all people.
- Let us pray for the gift of the Holy Spirit, that we be granted faith and so rejoice that the Scriptures have been fulfilled in our hearing; that we, like our Lord who was in the synagogue each Sabbath, make a habit of being in God's house to hear His promises and feast on Christ's Supper; and that we earnestly desire His higher gifts. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for a deeper appreciation of the gift of unity, that our Father forgive us for acting like some of His people are more important than others; that He lead all of us to realize that we have been baptized into one body of Christ; and that He grant us faith to use the Spirit's gifts to care for each other. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.

- Let us pray for the Office of the Ministry, that as God has appointed apostles, prophets and teachers, He strengthen, guide and provide for those who preach and teach God's Word to us; that He enable them to help us understand that Word as the Levites helped the Israelites; and that we marvel at the gracious words of God, that they speak to us as the people of Nazareth marveled at Jesus' words. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for Lutheran schools, teachers and students, that our Father bless those who administer, teach and learn in our early childhood centers, elementary schools, high schools, colleges and seminaries; that He use these educational institutions to prepare His people for fruitful service in His kingdom; and that He lead many to serve as pastors, teachers, deaconesses, DCEs and workers in His Church. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for the mission of the Church, that the Holy Spirit use missionaries throughout the world and each of us in our daily vocations to proclaim good news to the poor, liberty to the captives and fulfillment of the Scriptures; and that He grant repentance and faith to unbelieving hearts. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for those who govern our communities and country, that they be given wisdom and courage to lead with truth and justice; that they follow God's will rather than man's whims; and that our Father grant us a willingness to support them with our prayers and encouragement. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for those who suffer from the calamities of nature and the evils of mankind, that the God of mercy heal the injured, comfort those who mourn, shelter those who are homeless and bring aid to all who are in need; that He bring the hope of Jesus to situations that seem hopeless; that He give us hearts that reach out in love; and that He grant to all relief workers courage in danger, skill in difficulty and compassion in service. Lord, in Your mercy,
- **C** hear our prayer.
- Let us pray for all mothers with child, including those in difficult circumstances, that God protect the unborn, care for mothers, show to all the value of each child and give the body of Christ a heart that provides refuge for women who are scared and children who seem unwanted. Lord, in Your mercy,
- C hear our prayer.

	Let us pray for the comfort and the care of those who need healing, that the Great Physician mend the bodies and uplift the spirits of all who need His compassion, including Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
	Let us pray for those who rejoice in the rich blessings of God, especially, that they may always remember the Giver of every gift and give Him heartfelt thanks. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
P	Let us pray for ( and) all who grieve, that the One who raises the dead comfort each of them with the promise of His presence and with the assurance that the day is coming when He will bid all the dead to arise and will welcome into heaven all who lived and died with faith in Him. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
	Let us pray for all those who have committed themselves to our prayers, especially, and for all of the needs and concerns which are unspoken and hidden in our hearts, that God who knows all and sees all would give His gracious and wise attention to our needs and desires, conforming all things to His holy will. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
	Let us pray for all who receive Christ's Body and Blood, that these gifts forgive our sins, unite us as one and enable us to rejoice together and suffer together as the body of Christ. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
	Let us give God thanks and praise for St. Titus, John Chrysostom, and for all those who have departed this life in the saving faith. And let us pray that the Lord will also grant to us our portion with all His saints in light. Lord, in Your mercy, hear our prayer.		
	Into Your hands, O Lord, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in Your mercy, through Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord.  Amen.







## The Distribution of Holy Communion


Holy Communion is celebrated in this place in the joyful confidence that Jesus Christ Himself comes to us to give us in bread and wine His very Body and Blood to offer to us the forgiveness of sins. All Baptized Christians who have been instructed in the meaning of this Sacrament and confess with us Christ's Real Presence in this Holy Meal are welcome to commune with us at this Altar. A fuller explanation of what Lutherans believe concerning Holy Communion may be found on page one of this worship folder.

Holy Communion is distributed to the congregation at the chancel rail. Please follow the direction of the ushers to make your way to the Altar. You may kneel or stand as you feel comfortable. The Sacrament is distributed in the following manner...Please extend your hand to the assistant to receive the Body of Christ. Christ's Blood may be received in one of two ways, using that which you feel most comfortable: 1) individual cups containing wine and white grape juice will be offered by the Pastor, or 2) drinking from the chalice. Children and those not wishing to receive the Sacrament are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing.

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

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


General Offerings received (5 Sundays): \$18,137 \* General Offerings needed to meet the budget: \$13,783


\* additionally, we received \$1,100 specifically for the sidewalk project - thank you!

Withdrawals from Thrivent (money market): \$0 Balance in Thrivent mutual funds: ~\$53,763

We're still planning for our upcoming sidewalk repairs (~\$13,000). Thanks to robust offerings recently, we have a little surplus in our checking account to help cover this, but we will still need to withdraw funds from Thrivent.

Overall in 2024, offerings were about \$11,500 above what we needed to meet the budget. This allowed us to put \$12,500 into our Thrivent savings. Keep in mind that our offerings for the year included \$4,200 from the Mekane Yesus congregation, and about \$17,500 in "outside" offerings (from non-members), which may not repeat in the future.


