





Anyone who desires, child or adult, may come forward to receive a blessing.

The Prayer of Thanksgiving and the Lord's Prayer:



The Distribution of Holy Communion

Holy Communion is celebrated in this place in the joyful confidence that Jesus Christ Himself comes to us to give us in bread and wine His very Body and Blood to offer to us the forgiveness of sins. All Baptized Christians who have been instructed in the meaning of this Sacrament and confess with us Christ's Real Presence in this Holy Meal are welcome to commune with us at this Altar. A fuller explanation of what Lutherans believe concerning Holy Communion may be found on page one of this worship folder.

Holy Communion is distributed to the congregation at the chancel rail. Please follow the direction of the ushers to make your way to the Altar. You may kneel or stand as you feel comfortable. The Sacrament is distributed in the following manner...Please extend your hand to the assistant to receive the Body of Christ. Christ's Blood may be received in one of two ways, using that which you feel most comfortable: 1) individual cups containing wine and white grape juice will be offered by the Pastor, or 2) drinking from the chalice. Children and those not wishing to receive the Sacrament are welcome to come forward to receive a blessing.

OUR LENTEN OBSERVANCE HAS BEGUN ... and you are invited to keep this sacred Serason of Lent through prayer, meditation, study and hearing God's Word, and acts of charity and self-denial as we walk with our Lord Jesus in these days of remembering His Passion, Death, and Resurrection.

Midweek Lenten Services ... We will continue our tradition of offering Midweek Lenten Services again this year on each of the Wednesdays in the Lenten Season (March 12, 19, & 26; and April 2 & 9). Our weekly services will use a spoken order of the Office of Vespers with Sermon.
